Focus Will Be on How Trauma Affects Care

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NEW YORK—MJHS Hospice and Palliative Care, through generous Holocaust survivor grant sponsorship and funding by UJA-Federation of New York, hosts a thought-provoking forum on Wednesday, May 11, 2011 from 10:00 a.m.-3:00 p.m. at The Museum of Jewish Heritage. The deeply moving event includes a Holocaust survivor's stirring testimony, an insightful keynote address about the unique issues faced by Holocaust survivors and the Second Generation—adult children of Holocaust survivors—and a stirring exhibit to foster discussion about the importance of culturally-sensitive and compassionate medical, physical, social and spiritual care for patients and their loved ones.

MJHS Hospice and Palliative Care is one of the largest such programs in New York state and the largest historically Jewish hospice program in the region. It remains one of the only hospice and palliative care organizations in New York City to focus on the physical, emotional and psychological pain and suffering experienced by Holocaust survivors and their families. *Halachic Pathway* is offered to every enrolled Jewish person. This option serves as a health care proxy that ensures all medical decisions will be made in consultation with the rabbi of the patient's choice.
